Workshop Descriptions: Session 1

A. The Historian as Detective: An Introduction to Historical Methodology

The presenter will introduce ten mini class activities focusing on historical methodology. Topics include primary vs. secondary sources, evaluating witnesses, analyzing documents, etc. Teachers will be encouraged to participate as students in a simulation class activity.

B. Gamifying Constitutional Crises: Using Active Learning Pedagogy and Simulations to teach American Government

This workshop will discuss the presenter's experience with "The Island Game" – a board game/role-playing scenario custom-designed for Plymouth State University's American Government class (PO 1025). This simulation requires students to design, staff, and guide their government through various ethical, legal, and diplomatic dilemmas drawn both from learning objectives and the outcomes of prior student decisions. The presentation will focus on how to plan and implement classroom simulations for teaching political science concepts such as the Constitution, political philosophies, and political parties/conflict. Particular attention will be paid to conceptual design, including suggestions for embedding game objectives/mechanics within more traditional learning objectives and assessments. The presentation will also discuss evidence indicating that this pedagogical approach activates intrinsic motivation and encourages deep learning of course content as well as soft skills such as collaborative decision-making and conflict resolution. This presentation may be of interest to educators who are interested in building practical civics skills and active citizenship through engaging their students' natural interest in games and gaming mechanics. It may also interest educators who are eager to learn more about Active Learning techniques they can adapt to their own classrooms.

C. Everything is a Primary Source Method and Podcast - An Introduction

The EPS method is not about building up a collection of new materials but recognizing the value of what we already have and finding the best way to integrate them into effect lessons and units. ------ If the Everything is a Primary Source podcast was an extension of my teaching strategies, then my live podcast enrichment activity is my attempt to reach even further outside my history classroom. The EPS Podcast LIVE! was launched in the Spring of 2022 and quickly became known as "Podcast Karaoke." Audience members become on-the-spot guests as they are invited to choose a pop culture "artifact" (toy, movie, book, game, etc.) and then record a conversation based on a critical thinking question. Podcast Karaoke is engaging, entertaining and educational.

D. IB Working with Sources!

The International Baccalaureate (IB) program values a solid education in working with and analyzing Social Studies sources. In fact, it is a significant portion of both the internal and external exams the program offers. This workshop will explain how IB approaches showing students how to evaluate and interpret sources in a critical and analytical manner. Educators who have never experienced the IB pedagogy will learn valuable approaches to source work that can be used in any social studies classroom. Attendees will receive an overview of the approaches used and then will have an opportunity to work on various classroom exercises that could be used with their own classes. Previous IB experience is not required.

E. Media Literacy in the age of A.I., Chatbots, and Deepfakes

Americans today are immersed in a world of social media that distorts truth and blurs the lines of reality. Add to that the emergence of artificial intelligence tools such as ChatGPT and the stage is set for our children to get confused and lost when navigating this modern media world. This session will provide participants with strategies for helping students understand and assess information presented on the internet with the goal of developing them into strong critical thinkers and good digital citizens.

F. A Womanless History: The Place for Inquiry

In this session teachers will learn about how women and gender history can expand the lives and experiences of all students. Teachers will walk away with over 70 inquiry-based, primary source for lesson plans on women's history spanning prehistory to present day. There will be a focus on labor history using Silk Roads, Industrial Revolution, and Gender Pay Gap as broad examples.

A. Teaching Hard History: Slavery in U.S. History

Inspired by the Slavery topic session of the George Washington Teacher Institute, this workshop will provide examples of content that can be covered with resources, methods to approaching this topic area, as well as the social-emotional aspect of covering hard history. Lastly, this workshop will provide the opportunity for a large group discussion.

B. Moose on the Loose: Social Studies for Granite State Kids

This session will focus specifically on the foundational civics instruction offered in New Hampshire's online statewide social studies curriculum, "Moose on the Loose: Social Studies for Granite State Kids." Learn how to adapt materials in the "Moose" for middle grade students in preparation for the new civics requirement in SB 216. Developed by the New Hampshire Historical Society for students and educators in grades 3–8, "Moose" provides everything you'll need to introduce your students to the ideas that underlay our system of government and the structures that Americans have established for self-governance. The "Moose" includes lesson plans, explainer videos, and fun, easy ways to work with primary and secondary sources.

C. Social Studies Without Silos

The presenter will discuss strategies and resources that can aid in fostering a full interdisciplinary approach to all middle school and high school social studies classes. This will include creating common language teachers and students can use to explore the complexities of economics, civics, history, geography, political science, psychology, sociology, and humanities classes. The goal is to create social studies classrooms where students see the connections and layers of all social studies disciplines and how they shape society.

D. Life Project – Impacts of Individual Economic Decisions

This presentation will share how teachers at an area high school incorporate a summative assessment that asks students to apply Economic concepts to their post-high school plan. Workshop Descriptions: Session 3

A. Women's History Beyond the Classroom

Staffs from two area national parks share unique approaches to centering women's history through dynamic education activities and placebased learning. Presenters will demonstrate how women's history is fundamental in all areas of social studies and offers important connections beyond social studies curriculum. The team at Saint-Gaudens NHP will focus on their recent initiative to develop lesson plans and virtual learning opportunities that bridge women's history and STEAM education for 4th grade learners. Rangers from Lowell NHP will share their hands-on approach to learning for all ages. This workshop is made possible with funding from the Dorothy C. Radgowski Learning Through Women's Achievement in Arts grant program of the National Trust for Historic Preservation.

B. Supreme Court Showdown: Battle of the Briefs

Get ready for some justice! The Street Law curriculum is focused on teaching students about the justice system, constitutional interpretation, analysis and historical context through interactive activities and trial simulations. Join us for a hands-on workshop where participants will experience one of Street Law's resources as a student would in your classroom. Familiarization of a Supreme Court case will be analyzed before teachers will read through the facts, issues and precedents of the case in order to classify arguments for both the petitioners and respondents in small groups Participants will also explore Street Law's resource library to become familiar with their extensive collection. By experiencing the lesson as their student, each teacher will be able to determine how they will adapt the ideas to their own curriculum, teaching style and student population.

C. Library Camp: Grades 6th-12th in the Academic Library

Our session will describe the details surrounding a library research visit by 6th graders to Plymouth State University. The teacher will describe the assignment and the preparations he made before the trip, including how he combined the research activities with an outdoor event. The librarian and teacher will describe the day itself, strategies for instruction and things we have learned to prepare for the next visit. We want to inspire teachers to expose their students to academic libraries in hopes those children or teens can envision their own later success working in these buildings as university students.

D. From the Fragments: Reflections of Teaching and Learning from Place-based NEH Summer Institutes

This workshop is open to all grade levels and will showcase a curricular research project in progress, based upon the collaborative archaeological and scholarly work within the From the Fragments storymap from the Great Bay Archaeological Survey. This resource is free to teachers, and centers local history from a variety of perspectives. This presentation will also include the ongoing curriculum development project associated with this storymap that teachers (we are planning on having co-teacher presenters from the project as well) who are actively contributing curricular artifacts to this public resource. These co-presenters are from a National Endowment from the Humanities, prestigious Landmarks of American History and Culture Summer Institutes. Teachers who participated in these institutes (Summer 2023) have been invited to participate in research surrounding how they incorporate these place-based experiences into their own communities as well as the public resource. The goal of this workshop is to center discussion around the essential work of K-12 educators in the design and implementation of inclusive and representative social studies education.


F. Civic Engagement in the 2024 Presidential Election: College Convention 2024












